- Bowls/plates/trays
- LEGO bricks separated into colour groups


SET UP:

Place LEGO bricks of the same colour on a tray. Set up a number of trays so more than 1 child can come to play.

VARIATIONS

- Have a themed week for example only white on Monday, Blue on Tuesday, etc.
- Make a theme to the colours chosen such as earth (green, brown, and yellow), or Greyscale (Black, dark grey and light grey).
- Add or take away minifigures to see the difference in builds made.
- Add or take away base plates to change how the children start their creation.

- It is away from a quiet play area?
- Is the table restricting the size of the creation the children can make? Could it go on the floor today?
- Is it an activity the children play with lots at home? If so could it go near the drop-off area so parents can easily connect with their children at this time?



- Trays or Mat
- Just 1 type of brick size/shape (for example a simple 2x2 or 2x4 brick).

SET UP:

Place the LEGO bricks on the trays or tip it all on the mat for children to work around.

VARIATIONS

- At the beginning of the week start with a small brick and each day introduce or change the activity to a larger brick....or start big and get smaller!
- If you do not have sufficient quantity make the activity with 2-3 different brick sizes, but just stick with the basic brick shape.
- Change it up from bricks and only put out minifigures and animals.

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- Is the table restricting the size of the creation the children can make? Could it go on the floor today?
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- Trays or Mat
- All kinds of parts that could be used to make a garden. Brown and green pieces, leaves, flowers, and plants.
- Base plates

SET UP:

- Place the LEGO bricks on the trays or tip it all on the mat for children to work around.
- Place a base plate at each chair for the gardening to begin on.

VARIATIONS

- Add other colours for the season you are in. Reds and oranges for Autumn. White for snow/frost in Winter. Lots of bright colours in Spring.
- Add in grey plates for children to use as pathways...and all the other ideas that they will come up with for it!

- It is away from a quiet play area?
- Is the table restricting the size of the creation the children can make? Could it go on the floor today?
- Is it an activity the children play with lots at home? If so could it go near the drop-off area so parents can easily connect with their children at this time?



- Trays/plate or bowls
- Just 20 fun pieces of LEGO


SET UP:

- Put just 20 pieces of LEGO on each tray/plate.
- You can make each plate the same or add 20 different pieces to each tray/plate.
- 1. Challenge the children to make a creation using all 20 pieces.
- 2. Take a photo of their creation.
- 3. Pull the creation apart and repeat step 1. Have fun!!!

VARIATIONS:

- Use just 10 pieces or increase it to 30 or 50 parts.
- Use the idea of the 1 colour game place 20 pieces of just 1 colour on the tray.
- Use small LEGO pieces or use the larger DUPLO pieces.

- It is away from a quiet play area?
- Is the table restricting the size of the creation the children can make? Could it go on the floor today?
- Is it an activity the children play with lots at home? If so could it go near the drop-off area so parents can easily connect with their children at this time?



- A little bit of LEGO (don't go overboard with too many parts)
- Wheels attached to axels
- Something to use as a ramp

SET UP:

- Place the LEGO on the mat/table
- Put the wheels in a separate container so they are easy for the children to locate
- Set up a board or something suitable that is sloped for a ramp.
- Get creative with the area add some checkered flags, add stop lights, add a sign indicating what the activity is.
- 1. HINT: Their cars will work better if they simply let them go instead of pushing them down the ramp (and you will avoid flying cars this way too)
- 2.EXTEND: suggest children modify the cars and see if it works better or worse than their first car.

- It is away from a quiet play area?
- Is the table restricting the size of the creation the children can make? Could it go on the floor today?
- Is it an activity the children play with lots at home? If so could it go near the drop-off area so parents can easily connect with their children at this time?



- Paper
- Inkpad or paint
- Various shaped LEGO pieces (circles, square, rectangle, triangle, & more)

SET UP:

- Provide a variety of paper shapes, colours and sizes for the children to use.
- Place a square or rectangle piece of LEGO onto the piece you will use for stamping (this acts as the grip)
- If using paint, place just a small amount in the tray.

VARIATIONS:

- Cut the paper into fun shapes too make circles, cut out an 'L" for LEGO
- Change the material children stamp onto wood, cardboard, a mirror.

Change up the colour ink/paint at the activity

- Is this positioned for easy clean up in case of spills?
- Can children easily access handwashing facilities, hang their artwork to dry, or get messy activity aprons?
- Is it an activity the children play with lots at home? If so could it go near the drop-off area so parents can easily connect with their children at this time?
